

This Sunday's Gospel Thoughts for the Week February 25, 2024



This is my beloved Son. Listen to him.

(Reading in Blue Missal: pg. 318)

1st Reading Gn 22:1, 9a, 10-13, 15-18 **Testing of Abraham** In Hebrew tradition, Abraham represents the classic example of faith. This tradition describes an honest man, how he goes through a tormenting experience of uncertainty, and how he finally resolves it. Guided by God, the author brings out a timeless message to all who wrestle with the problem of fidelity, faith and trust in a future. He teaches that there is a way out if we dare to persevere, hoping against all hope, and in faith get on our knees to pray. How do we stand fast when shadows of uncertainty and doubt or tormenting us? We could pray: "Father of light... free us from the original darkness that shadows our vision. Restore our sight that we may look upon your Son who call us to repentance and a change of heart.".

Responsorial Psalm: I will walk before the Lord, in the land of the living.

Reading Rom 2nd 8:31b-34 God Is for Us "If God is for us, who can be against us?" This one line states in a nutshell what the other two readings teach in story form. Abraham experienced it when he was faithful in the darkest moment of his life. The three apostles felt it when, in their doubt and embarrassment about the necessity of suffering in life, they enjoyed a moment of light and glory on the mount. We, God's chosen ones, should find consolation and courage in these words when we pass through the valley of darkness, doubt, and mental suffering.

Gospel Mk 9: 2-10

Jesus Transfigured What does Mark try to bring out by relating this tradition about Jesus' transfiguration? He knew the Abraham story of the First Reading: Abraham's faith, his suffering and mental pain, and finally God speaking! Mark follows the same pattern: He has Peter's profession of faith: "You are the Messiah", Jesus foretelling his suffering and our partaking in it, and finally God speaking. We must suffer physical and mental pain, but like Christ we will overcome. Notice that there is a mountain as in the first tradition, as well as the traditional cloud as sign of God's presence.



The Lord calls his stewards to participate in His redemptive activity. Heeding this call requires transformation, being willing to renounce patterns of behavior that draw us away from God. In this coming week of Lent, let us pray for the grace to be transformed, so that by our goodness and generosity, we may walk more au-

thentically in the footsteps of Jesus.

Why is Lent 40 Days Long?

Lent is forty days long because Jesus fasted in the wilderness forty days and forty nights before embarking on His public ministry. But Jesus did not select the length of His fast at random. Throughout the Old Testament, a stretch of forty days (or years) has always carried a deep meaning often related to punishment, penance, and/or preparation. Here are a few examples:

- During Noah's time, God sent rain for forty days and forty nights to punish the earth with flood.
- In consequence of their lack of faith, the Israelites wandered in the desert forty years before reaching the Promised Land.
- The people of Nineveh fasted and repented to avert the wrath of God which the prophet Jonah predicted would come upon them in forty days.
- Both Moses and Elijah fasted **forty days** before or during important conversations with God.

When the time came for Jesus to begin His public mission, He utilized this tradition. His mission was of an allencompassing nature that taps into—and fulfills—all the biblical reasons for forty day events. As the God-Man, He was embarking on His mission to be our Mediator—to converse with God on our behalf, as Moses and Elijah did in a prefigurative way. As the one Man Who came to bear the punishment due to all men, He evokes the repentance of Nineveh that averted the punishment of God. His time in the desert—reminiscent of the Israelites' forty year sojourn proffers the idea that He is deliberately taking on the punishment due to our faithlessness, which otherwise would keep us away from the Promised Land of Heaven. The season of Lent is our great opportunity to enter into the desert with Christ. Do you have a plan for how to approach these days and gain the incredible graces they offer us? One way to enter into the desert with Christ is by meditating on our own death. Lent is a time when we remember the death of Christ and the sacrifice he made to give us eternal life.
