# <u>This Sunday's Gospel</u> <u>Thoughts for the Week</u> August 20, 2023

Reading in Blue Missal: pg. 229

Today and every day we celebrate the goodness of God.

#### <u>1st Reading Is 56: 1,6-7</u> Justice and Salvation for All

After the Hebrews returned from exile in Babylon, they found many foreigners not of the Jewish religion living there. The anonymous prophet called Third Isaiah had to face this changed situation. Ezekiel, "the father of Judaism," was opposed to uncircumcised foreigners in the temple precincts. The composer of this poem is not so rigorous. He lists the conditions under which non-Jews may worship in the temple. "Their burnt offerings and sacrifices will be acceptable on my (God's) altar." This passage has been chosen to introduce the idea of universalism found in today's Gospel reading. "May the peoples praise you, O God!"

**Responsorial Psalm:** O God, let all the nations praise you!

#### 2nd Reading Rom 11:13-15, 29-32 Irrevocable Gifts and Call

We must interpret this reading in light of Paul's misconception that the end, that is, the second coming of Christ, would occur during his lifetime. Israel rejects the message of Christ; hence, Paul turns to the Gentiles (non-Jews). This will provoke Israel's jealousy and they will join before the end! Matthew, who wrote some thirty years later, had to make a slight adjustment in Paul's vision of Salvation History. This adjustment should not shock us. The Bible itself suggests that the understanding of Salvation History should be adjusted constantly in the light of changing circumstances. In dealing with the Jews and their religion, we should keep in mind Paul's statement: "The gifts and the call of God are irrevocable." Anti-Semitism is wrong. Israel's place in Salvation History is God's concern, not ours. The Jews deserve our love, respect, and gratitude! Christ, Mary, Joseph, and the apostles were all Jews and our Old Testament is the Hebrew Bible.

#### Gospel Mt 15: 21-28 Reward of Faith

Matthew took this story from Mark. But he molded it to bring out a message for the Church of his day, which was beset with constant friction between Christians from Jewish background and pagan converts. We see therein classic Jewish exclusionism as opposed to God's universal will of salvation for all. Matthew wants to stress the fact that faith breaks down the barrier between Gentiles and Jews. "Jesus said to her in reply, "O woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." God's word to the Church of today is clear: Do not condemn people! Have an open-minded respect for all who seriously follow their religious convictions, provided of course that they fulfill their obligation to find the truth. "God wills everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth."
