The third Sunday of Advent is traditionally called Gaudete Sunday, the Latin word for rejoice.

Heavenly Father, this third week of Advent, let us remember that the good news of Jesus' birth has the power to bring us great joy this Christmas season. Our joy isn't dependent on what is going on in our life, in our world, or the people that we are with. It doesn't depend on the gifts we give or the gifts we find under the tree. No earthly thing can ever give us complete joy. Our joy comes from you. That joy that flooded the hearts of the shepherds, the angels, the wise men, the hosts of heaven, and Mary and Joseph is the joy that still has the power to overwhelm our hearts with rejoicing. Our joy doesn't come from our jobs, our family, our relationships, our finances, or our success. Our joy doesn't come from what we have on earth or who we are with. Our joy is a gift. It is the gift that you gave us that first Christmas in Jesus Christ. Our joy is encompassed in our Savior, King Jesus. Flood our heart with joy this Advent season as we reflect on the good news of Jesus' birth. In Jesus' precious name we pray. Amen.

This Sunday's Gospel Thoughts for the Week December 12, 2021



1st Reading Zep 3:14-18a Joy Over the Mighty Savior

This reading invites "daughter Zion" (Zion is the holy temple mountain in Jerusalem, hence stands for God's people) to rejoice because salvation from all enemies and evil is at hand. We should read this passage to inspire our Advent awareness that God will save us.

Life has meaning. It can be beautiful. "God indeed is my savior; I am confident and unafraid" (Responsorial Psalm).

Responsorial Psalm:

Cry out with joy and gladness: for among you is the great and Holy One of Israel.

2nd Reading Phil 4:4-7 Rejoice in the Lord

"The Lord is near." Whatever our ailments and anxieties are (see Theme), we can turn to him. "Have no anxiety at all." Rejoice, because we Christians know to whom we should turn for peace and happiness. This reading offers a "crash program" for preparation for Christmas.

Gospel Lk 3:10-18 Majesty of the Messiah

We see by this reading that there were people who reacted to John the Baptist's sermons: "What should we do?" In searching for meaning in life, we ask this question too. It all depends whether or not we are "filled with expectation." Do we look at a future? Do we believe in Jesus to come, who will baptize us (immerse us) in the Holy Spirit and fire?

There are wheat and chaff also in our lives. With our doubts, problems, and anxieties, we should turn to the Lord Jesus. He is concerned. Immersed in the Holy Spirit, we should come to new life! Christmas could be a new start for us.

My Fellow Parishioners,

"Pastor's Corner"

The third Sunday of Advent is called "Gaudete Sunday." "Gaudete" means "Rejoice!" This is the theme expressed by St. Paul in his Letter to the Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord always!" Why does St. Paul insist that we rejoice? We must remember that he wrote this Letter to the Philippians while he was in a dark Roman prison and without any certainty that he can still come out alive.

Definitely, there was nothing to rejoice about being imprisoned. But joy is a virtue and a gift of the Holy Spirit. It is not dependent on any external condition. Rather, it all depends on one's intimate relationship with God. A person who knows the Lord is with him at all times, that the Lord is near, always has the reason to rejoice, that is, to be filled with joy. And that spirit leads him to be more kind and understanding towards others.

There is the story about a man known as Joe the Farmer. Every day, on his way to the farm, he would make it a point to drop by the Church at exactly eight o'clock in the morning. In less than a minute, he can be seen leaving the church. The priest noticed his daily routine and asked him about it one day. Joe said, "Father, I just drop by every day to say hello to my friend. I look at him. He looks at me. Then I tell him, 'Hi, Jesus! This is your friend, Joe. Have a great day!' Then I go."

One day, Joe got sick, and was brought to the hospital. He had no family, and so no one visited him. But the nurses were surprised that Joe provided joy and laughter to his fellow patients. His humor and cheerful spirit were just contagious. A nurse asked him: "Joe, what is the secret of your happiness?" He replied, "Well, it is because of my friend who comes to visit me every day." The nurse was surprised. "But you have no visitor. You have no family and friends." But Joe insisted, "Yes, I have a friend. He comes here every day at eight o'clock in the morning. He looks at me, and says, 'Hey, Joe. This is your friend, Jesus. I just dropped by to say hello!" Joe had no family. He had no money. He had no health. But he was happy, because he had a friend, Jesus, who visits him every day. That was the secret of his happiness. And his happiness makes him more kind and loving towards others. This is exactly the meaning of St. Paul's exhortation: "Rejoice in the Lord always!"

Christmas is near, but are we rejoicing? Are we filled with joy? Far from making us happy, the busy season leaves most us physically tired and financially drained. We often hear people complaining about the economic crisis. Many are jobless, homeless and still many others are sick. The recent pandemic and death have left many families and communities devastated. There is so much bad news every day. What is there to rejoice about? God is not anymore present in our Christmas celebration. The greeting "Merry Christmas" is replaced with "Happy Holidays!" The image of the Holy Family in Bethlehem is dwarfed by the ubiquitous giant Christmas Tree. Jesus Christ is totally overshadowed by Santa Claus. Many people don't even bother to go to Mass on these days. So, when Christ is taken away from Christmas, when God is absent from our gatherings and celebrations, what is there left to rejoice about?
